Global grants





GLOBAL GRANTS

- Large, long-term projects
- Humanitarian, scholarships, vocational training teams (VTT)
- Sustainable, measurable outcomes
- Alignment with areas of focus
- International partnership
- \$30,000 minimum budget
- World Fund match



AREAS OF FOCUS

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development















GLOBAL GRANT APPLICATION: COMMON ISSUES

- No fit to area of focus
- Lack of sustainability
- Insufficient detail in information provided
- A "bundle" of projects
- A "wish-list" project
- A "pre-designed" project
- Another organization's project/non-Rotary project
- Insufficient host buy-in/support
- Insufficient Rotarian participation



SUSTAINABILITY

Sustainability means different things to different organizations.

For Rotary, sustainability means providing long-term solutions to community needs that the beneficiaries can maintain after grant funding ends.





Start with the community



Identify a need and develop a solution that builds on community strengths and aligns with local values and culture.



Encourage local ownership


Identify key community members who can help pioneer lasting improvements.

A project's success depends on people.

Purchase equipment and technology from local sources.





Find local funding

Get local funding through governments, hospitals, companies, and other organizations.





Measure your success

RELEASE OF GRANT CENTER

- Launched in December 2016
 - New look
 - Streamlined global grant application
- Positive feedback
- Global grant reporting will be updated in late January 2018



GLOBAL GRANT SCHOLARSHIPS

- Applications for scholars who begin their studies in August, September or October are due by 30 June.
- Submit applications at least three months before the scholar's intended departure date.



CONSTRUCTING LOW COST SHELTERS AND SIMPLE SCHOOLS

- Three year pilot beginning 1 January 2017
- Clubs and districts may use global grants to build low-cost shelters and simple schools
- Construction must be a part of a comprehensive project related to an area of focus
- Guidelines and application appendixes available on My Rotary



MANDATORY COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT

- Will be a requirement as of 1 July 2018
- Must include results in application
- You can use district grant funds to conduct the assessment

WHAT IS A COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT?

- Examines strengths, weaknesses, needs, assets
- Helps to identify relevant opportunities for projects






BENEFITS

TIPS


- Remain open minded

AREAS OF FOCUS POLICY STATEMENTS

With respect to the areas of focus policy statements, The Rotary Foundation notes that

- The goals of the Foundation are to increase efficiency in grant processing and ensure quality funded projects;
- 2. The content of each policy statement is intended to represent eligible and ineligible activities
- 3. Eligible activities reflect those that Rotary clubs and districts have most often implemented;
- 4. Project planning is a bottom-up and host club/district-driven process;
- 5. All grant requests must comply with the policy statements related to each area of focus.

PEACE AND CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION

Rotary supports the training, education, and practice of peace and conflict prevention and resolution

Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals

TRF enables Rotarians to promote the practice of peace and conflict prevention/resolution by:

- 1. Training leaders, including potential youth leaders, to prevent and mediate conflict;
- 2. Supporting peace-building in communities and regions affected by conflict;
- Supporting studies for career-minded professionals related to peace and conflict prevention/resolution.

Parameters for Eligibility

TRF considers activities targeting the following to be within the scope of the peace and conflict prevention/resolution area of focus:

- Community activities targeting non-Rotarian participants, including conferences, trainings, and camps, in support of nonviolence, peace-building, and human rights;
- Facilitated conflict resolution workshops related to topics addressing community needs such as
 policy development, business activities across conflict lines, educational reform, and peace
 iournalism:
- 3. Supporting initiatives addressing psychological effects of conflict;
- 4. Educating youth on preventive measures to avoid conflict:



TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR ROTARY FOUNDATION DISTRICT GRANTS AND GLOBAL GRANTS

For grants awarded after 1 July 2013

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) may modify the terms and conditions of the grant at any time. Updates can be found on www.notary.org/grants or requested from Rotary grants staff. Terms and conditions for packaged grants may be found on the website.

I. WHAT WE FUND

The Rotary Foundation funds district grants and global grants. District grants are block grants to districts that fund scholarships, projects, and travel that align with the mission of The Rotary Foundation, which is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. Global grants fund scholarships, projects, vocational training teams, and some travel within the six areas of focus that are sustainable, measurable, and host community-driven.

II. ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES

All Foundation grant activities must:

- 1. Relate to the mission of The Rotary Foundation
- 2. Include the active participation of Rotarians
- 3. Exclude any liability to The Rotary Foundation or Rotary International beyond the funding amount of the grant
- 4. Adhere to the governing laws of the United States and the host area of the grant, and harm no individuals or entities. Sponsors for projects and travel planned for countries sanctioned by the US Department of the Treasury Office of Foreign Assets Control may need to supply additional information.
- 5. Only fund activities that have been reviewed and approved by TRF before their implementation. Grants may not be used to reimburse clubs or districts for activities and expenses already completed or in progress. Planning for grant activities prior to approval is encouraged, but expenses may not be incurred. After grant approval, any changes to the original project plan must be pre-approved by TRF. TRF considers each semester of a degree program to be a new activity and therefore eligible for funding.
